OTHER SUGGESTED ACTIVITIES

Language Development

- Reinforce the names of nocturnal animals (owl, hedgehog, bat, badger etc)

Early Mathematical Development

- Have fun finding shapes in the environment e.g. what shape is the door, window etc?
- Search for items of a particular colour

Physical Development

- Practise using a knife and fork
- Use empty containers in the sink or bath to practise pouring skills
- Develop scissor skills by cutting strips of paper with safety scissors

The Arts

- Use junk art to make space rockets

WHOOOOOOOSSSSSSHHHHH!



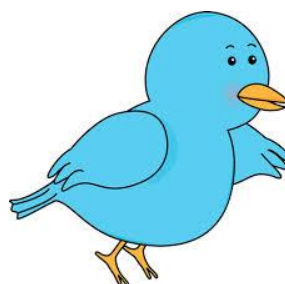
Bird cake recipe

Not suitable for children with nut allergies

Note that bird seed, including peanuts bought for birds, are not suitable for human consumption

You will need:

- Bird seed
- Raisins
- Peanuts
- Grated cheese
- Lard
- An empty yoghurt pot



Steps:

Carefully make a small hole in the bottom of a yoghurt pot. Thread string through the hole and tie a knot on the inside. Leave enough string so that you can tie the pot to a tree or bird table.

Allow the lard to warm up to room temperature, but don't melt it. Cut the lard into small pieces and put it in a bowl.

Add the other ingredients and squeeze the mixture together with your hands until the fat holds it altogether.

Fill your yoghurt pots with bird cake mixture and put it in the fridge to set for an hour or so.

Take your bird cake out of the fridge and carefully cut the pot away from the cake and hang up in the garden.
